Personal Directive Policy No. 414

Policy Statement: Archdiocesan priests are encouraged to write a personal directive.

Intent of Policy: In the event a priest is unable to make decisions about his non-

financial matters, including medical care, a substitute decision maker

may be chosen to assist with these decisions.

Definition: A personal directive states a person's wishes about non-financial

decisions, including medical care, when they can no longer make the

decisions on their own.

A personal directive includes the name of an "agent", a substitute decision maker, who has the authority to make these non-financial

decisions.

The personal directive is a legal document.

Procedure: a) The priest needs to share his feelings on life, illness, and death as well as his wishes about end of life care with the agent, and if

appropriate, with other family members.

b) A lawyer can be, but is not required to be, involved in creating a

personal directive.
